- Will teachers need to learn new curriculum and grade levels?
- What happens to the current special education model: dual/inclusion?
- What are our teams going to look like?
- Will special ed and ELL model need to change?

Strengths of our current model

- Options
- We currently have opportunity to be flexible
- Leveled instruction allows for improved instruction in the classroom
- Flexible groupings are a strength as we can move students in and out
- Whole school schedule that allows for common planning
- Implementation of Responsive Classroom and consistency
- Flexible, Skills-based groupings
 - Easier to plan
 - Easier to differentiate
- Centers based instruction
- Grouping, but not labeling or tracking
- Freedom of teachers to make decisions
